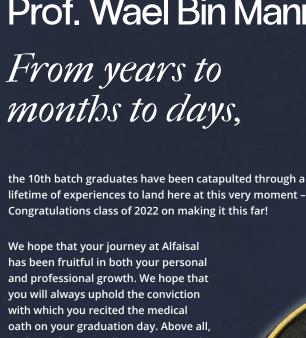
#### As this academic year,

#### With HH Prince Bandar bin Saud bin Khalid



The work being done at the King Faisal Foundation (KFF) is truly phenomenal. It has allowed youngsters like us to dream and achieve. We would like to start off by asking for a brief introduction on Your Highness's role at the Foundation and on the establishment of Alfaisal University itself.

I am the Secretary General of King Faisal foundation, and I have been entrusted by the Board of Trustees to manage the day-to-day work of the foundation. This includes two sides: the philanthropic side and the investment side. I've been in this post since 1993; however, I joined the foundation initially in1983. So, it has been almost 40 years now.

The university has been in the minds of the Board of Trustees since the inception of the foundation itself. And therefore, if you go back and read the bylaws of the foundation which came out with the Royal Decree, you will find that one of the goals stated is establishing universities.

HRH Prince Khalid Alfaisal, who was the managing director of the foundation and the CEO of the KFF, had the dream of building a university from the very beginning. At that time, the laws in Saudi Arabia did not allow for private universities. The first step was a private college that we started in Abha, which inspired the idea of a fully-fledged university. Hence, that was when we thought about Alfaisal University. I, along with others, were entrusted by the Board of Trustees to establish Alfaisal University.

We formed multiple committees to help set it up. We embarked on a world tour to the United States and Europe to visit some of the top international institutions. We managed to not only gain knowledge, but also to create lasting relationships with faculty members and top-class administration teams.

Stevens Institute of Technology in New Jersey was amongst the first ones who became an integral part of the team that established Alfaisal. We visited Harvard University and formed a relationship between Harvard medical school and Alfaisal University. In addition, during our international trip, we met with great minds like the faculty of MIT and Cambridge. At the end of the trip, we formed a core team of eight members; half of whom were from MIT and the other half was from Cambridge. Between Harvard and this core team, we went on to establish the first three colleges: Medicine, Science, and Engineering. We also had a local team here that worked with Stevens to establish the College of Business.

Then Alfaisal was launched with these four colleges.

Dr. Khaled Al-Kattan was a member of our initial College of Medicine team, and he is still with us today, thankfully. He was the first dean of the medical school and now he is also the Vice President of the university. My role was to lead the core team in the establishment of the college, formation of relationships, setting of laws and bylaws, and finally forming a system that we could take to the Ministry of Education. A private university was a new experience for the Ministry of Higher Education at that time and it wasn't easy at all, but it was a learning curve for both of us. There were no bylaws for private universities to guide us, so we had to come up with our own and then the ministry had to come up with something generic for all of the universities; to match the two took a long time.

The King Faisal family donated the palace to the King Faisal Foundation and then the board of the Foundation decided that this is where the university should be. Next to the palace, we built Alfaisal campus. We were also pioneers in another sense; we introduced the first ever co-ed education in Saudi Arabia and I believe till now it is the only university with co-ed. So, we had to be creative, we wanted to provide young women with the same quality of education which the young men received and to ensure that they were equal in every sense. Hence, we came up with the idea of having classrooms split into two levels in order to meet the laws. Students were all in the same class, learning from the same professor, but just on two different floors. It was a challenge, but it was achieved.

After that, we had to choose the people who were going to be part of the university. One of the first individuals that joined us was HRH Princess Maha bint Mishari. Thank God, today, we're sitting here, talking about it, and we can see the results. It is something that we are all proud of. This wouldn't have been possible, if it weren't also for the quality of students that we have.

At the end of the day, buildings and all other resources don't mean anything. They are just a means to allow for a good education to be practiced. The core of any university is excellent faculty and students.

We only see the success story in front of us, but the herculean efforts that went into building this success remain unknown to many, and people are eager to hear them in your own words. What was the initial vision that KFF sprouted on and what was the motto that it stood for?

When I met with the Minister of Education at that time to try and get more independent bylaws for the university, he asked me, "why do you need that?" I told him,

If we were to simply build a cookie cutter university, it'll just be duplicating what was already available. We can all generate new ideas and learn from each other; and that can only lead to elevating education to a higher standard than what we have right now. The main goal for us is to reach the highest possible level of education that we can offer. Quality is the main goal.

The student is the core of the whole university and that's why we say Alfaisal is student centered. We don't want it to have a one-way teaching system, we want to foster creativity and research.

When I went to Harvard Kennedy School of Management, the Dean asked me, "what kind of faculty are we looking for?" I told him:

"I don't want to hire faculty that will teach from the books. I want to hire the faculty who wrote the books."

It's very important that we graduate leaders, not employees. People who can create jobs, not just fill them. Our country is young, but it has huge potential. With the right education, equipped with the most brilliant youth, there is no limit to what we can achieve. We just need to provide them with the right tools to excel.

KFF has given the opportunity for 100s, if not 1000s of students to prosper and through the KFF's philanthropic endeavors you've touched so many lives, not just in Saudi Arabia, but even across the globe. How does that feel, Your Highness, to have transformed so many lives?

Well, that's our motto, setting trends, touching lives. We think that we can still do more; there is no limit. And the need is much larger that we will always look for new ways in which we can serve societies and improve people's lives be it young, old, men, women, or children, especially in developing countries.

The King Faisal Foundation has an international reach and is not limited to Saudi Arabia. We take our goals from the late King Faisal. If you go back to his history, a video shows he was asked in an interview, "where do you see Saudi Arabia 50 years from now?" He said,

"أتمنى أن تكون المملكة مصدر إشعاع للإنسانية"

Which translates into: I hope Saudi Arabia will become the source of enlightenment for all humanity. For us, that's a mission, and we strive to do different things to achieve that for the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia and from Saudi Arabia. We believe that education is the agent of change. If you want to accelerate a society's progress, you have to provide it with proper education. So that's how we do it. This is what we aim to continue to do. This will forever be the foundation's aim for hundreds of years to come. We're all not going to be here, but the foundation will be. We wish to leave behind something that is sustainable and long term that never veers from the goals that it was established for.



If we take a look at Alfaisal University as an institution, it has grown in terms of its research and world university rankings. More importantly, it's a very unique university providing extracurricular activities to even medical students. How do you feel when witnessing Alfaisal's growth across these years?

I feel very proud. It's the students of this university that have made this possible. It's not only the growth; it's also the achievements and recognition that they have earned. This university is really young. For us to achieve such accomplishments in such a short period of time is truly remarkable. We are now number one in the Middle East especially in terms of the College of Medicine. This is something I have been humbled by and I thank everybody, especially the faculty and students at CoM, for contributing to this growth. Part of the success is also because of the rigorous acceptance policy of the university; we concentrate on accepting excellent students that are able to contribute to their community. In order to achieve that, we introduced the King Faisal Foundation Scholarship Program.

#### WE DON'T WANT ALFAISAL UNIVERSITY TO BE FOR THE FINANCIAL ELITE; WE WANT IT TO BE FOR THE INTELLECTUAL ELITE.

We want those who excelled in high school and don't have the financial means to have a chance at attending an excellent university like Alfaisal University.

If they cannot afford it, we will pay for them to get a good education.

We have also equipped our students with the skills they in order need to succeed internationally. Around 30 of our graduates this year are in American fellowship programs. Last year, we had more students going abroad; about 39 out of 43. So, I'm very happy. However, happy doesn't mean we stop here. We have to aspire for more. Because if you stop, you die; you have to continue achieving more. Your ambition should always be higher than where you are today. That's how we continue excelling. It is easy to get to the top, but it's very hard to stay at the top. So, we still have a lot of work ahead of us. Not only us, you too; we hope together we can continue this journey forever.

I'm one of the final year medical students graduating this year. Along with me, there are many future physicians, pharmacists, scientists, engineers, and the future visionaries of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia. What are your expectations of the graduating students from Alfaisal university?

Well, first of all, we expect students to go back to their societies, wherever they are, and to serve them. That's the only condition we have for the scholarship program. As this program is international, we have students coming from different parts of the world. Their family, university, and society have provided for them all their life; now they are ready and it's their duty to give back to their societies.

The question is, what do you want? What do you want for your society? How do you want the place you live in to be? Don't you want good schools, hospitals, roads, services, and a good life for you and your kids? If you want that, then start working on it. Do your part; your small part coupled with his small part and her small part will make a dramatic difference.

Your Highness, as you mentioned, the King Faisal Foundation has accomplished so much already and has touched so many lives. Concerning Alfaisal University specifically, what are some future plans that you have in place for it?

As of now the main goal is to reach a state of balance. We're still expanding and adding new programs. The next step would be expanding to other areas in Saudi Arabia. Having said that, our aim is not the quantity but the quality of the university.

For example, if you go to MIT, it hosts 4000 students. It's exactly where we are today. Another aim is to put more money into research and have more labs. We want projects that can help solve problems in Saudi Arabia.

For example, the Kingdom gets almost all of its water from desalination. Why not explore a more affordable method of doing so? Another important area to research is sustainable clean energy. As a university, we need to start tackling such issues involving the colleges of engineering and science. The college of Medicine should shed light on prominent health problems, like cancer and obesity and attempt to address them. I truly believe that we have the faculty and the students that can accomplish such goals.

#### Looking at all that you have accomplished at the King Faisal foundation, what is one accomplishment that you hold near and dear to your heart and why?

Alfaisal University is definitely at the top. There are also other projects in Saudi Arabia, like Al Habala project, which was a very important project. We went to areas where there was near to nothing and created educated communities. In Al Habala, the people used to live on the side of a mountain and to reach their houses by climbing down the mountain with ropes. King Faisal Foundation built a village at the top of the mountain for them. We moved their houses out of the valley, and the newly established town was provided with all the services they needed, including clinics, small schools, social services, and fire services. Years later, these villages now have professors and universities. The foundation also built a cable car to go from the top of the mountain to their old houses. By doing so we were able to convert that society from a stagnant one to an active one that is now giving back. This is the transformation we're looking for. These projects are very dear to my heart because we did not go and just build things; we actually transformed people from one state to another, making them active members of the society. They now have a decent lifestyle and are very well educated. Another very special project is Alfaisal Scholarship program.

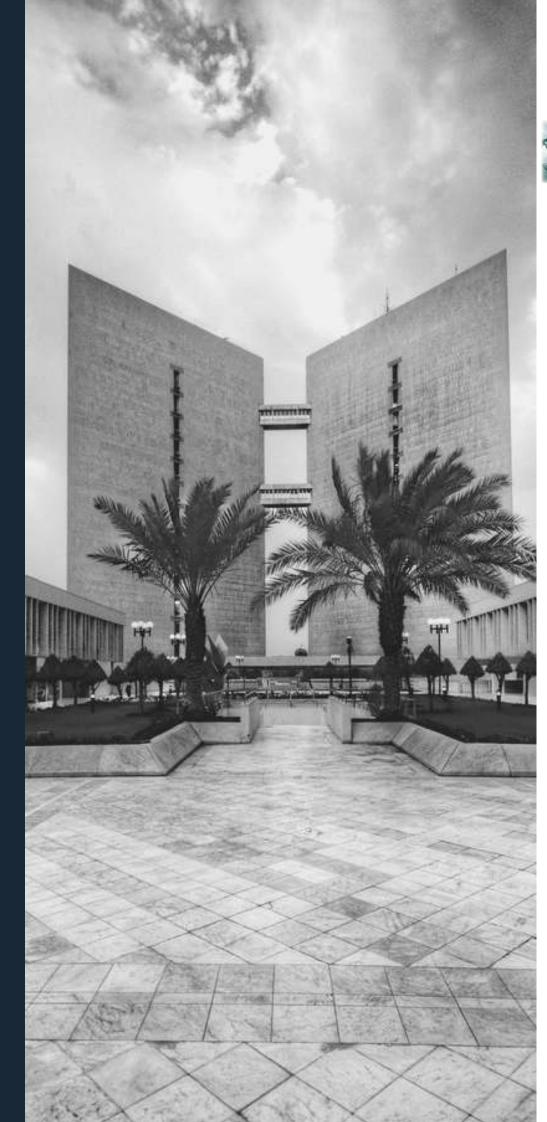
#### Three special words, faith, knowledge and performance. These three words were chosen to represent the university. **Why were these three specific words chosen?**

Because those were the words of King Faisal. We took the three pillars and made them our motto and goal. Education is the best way to do it. Hopefully through the upcoming generations, this goal will become a reality

#### If you were to give one piece of advice to the future generations, what would that be?

Two things. First thing is faith. Don't move away from whatever your faith is. For us, in Saudi Arabia, of course, it is Islam. Nowadays, it is easy to stray away from your faith. The second one is hard work. Work hard for whatever you believe in. Work hard for your country, work hard for your family, and for yourself. If you have the faith and you work hard, you will go places and reach farther heights in life, and you will achieve worthwhile goals and ranks.

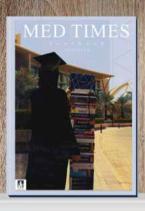


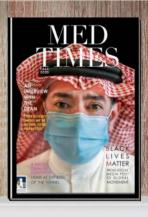

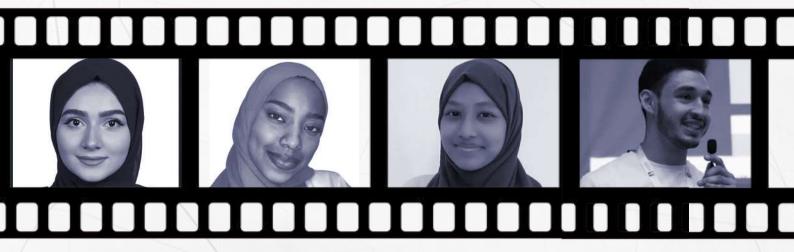

He wanted to pursue that life for himself as he sought true community and partnership through learning. Payam expressed that she had always been interested in research, and was fascinated by the opportunities our university served that allowed students to prosper in gaining a sound background through research and experimentation. In addition, our university ranks high in the number of medical graduates that are matched into U.S residency programs, which further drew her to join Alfaisal. On inquiring Momo about what she thinks makes our community unique, she beautifully mentioned how the MSA has taught her the true value of working together as a group to reach a certain goal. Payam described how her journey at Alfaisal had started through the CVP block, and how she had learned through the tribulations of a new and competitive environment, how to maintain patience and perseverance. Alaa stressed on how her experience as a medical student helped her acquire many skills through academic learning and extracurriculars. She highlighted how the uphill battle was -and still is- worth it. I was interested in knowing if any of the students had an experience that had solidified

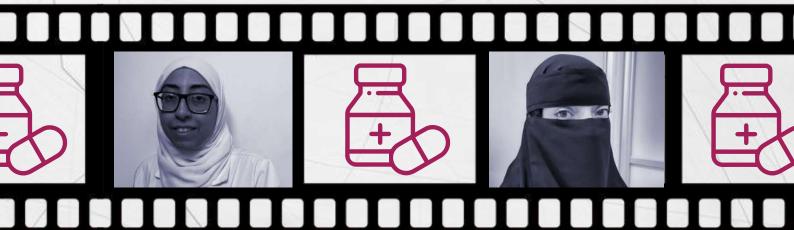
their experience on campus subjectively. Premed, for Momo, was incredibly constructive and helpful as a freshman, so much so that she volunteered to be a part of the team the following year.

How has our university helped them prepare for the world of work? Having started her clinical years, Alaa drew the comparison between our academic environment and the hospital environment as one that was similar, yet still required vital preparation, as managing workload and exercising critical thinking are essential to both. She placed emphasis on the Professional Skills course, as she credits it for being one of the most beneficial and eye-opening courses she has taken. She learned how to deal with patients, their mannerisms, and how to reach a differential diagnosis professionally.

Our services in Alfaisal are also known to be exceedingly exceptional. a job at those companies once they have graduated, and earn an abundance of work experience first-hand.

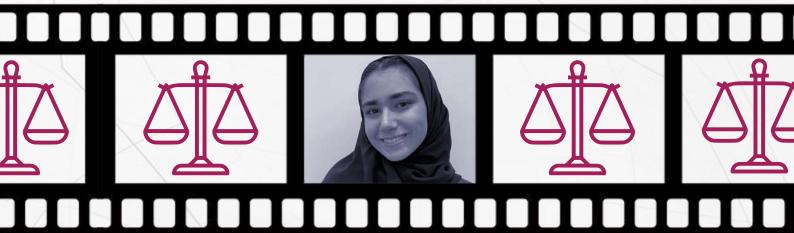

He ensures the smooth running of all MSA activities, including supervising the MSA board election, discussing and approving the team's future plans for serving the student body, and providing insight on how the system should work to maximize efficiency & efficacy. Over the years, Dr. Akef has played a pivotal role, taking time out of his busy schedule to meet with students regularly, looking at the MSA's action plans, as well as post-event analysis. 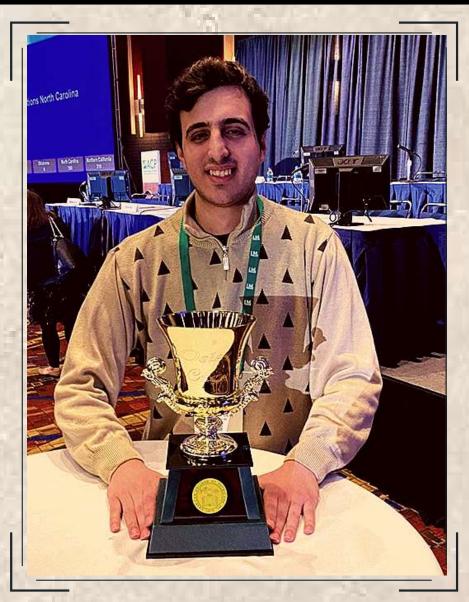

# ALFAISAL ALUMNUS WINS THE OSLER CUP



Dr. Omar Ahmad Khdeir is a graduate of the 6th batch of the college of medicine at Alfaisal. He is currently a 2nd year Internal Medicine resident at East Carolina University in North Carolina, United States.

During his time as a teaching assistant at Alfaisal, Dr. Khdeir has been an extraordinary educator to his students and an even more supportive mentor. He has a gift of simplifying any complex topic into a digestible format and goes above and beyond to devise new teaching methods to get the message across. In his PRO classes, he used to pull up UWorld questions as soon as he physical finishes teaching the examination skill for that particular topic and this teaching method easily hit a home run amongst many of his ardent listeners.

In recent times, Dr. Khdeir has added a feather to his cap by winning the distinguished

American College of Physicians Doctor's Dilemma competition.

This is the biggest Internal Medicine knowledge-based competition in the world. It brings together some of the brightest residents from across the globe in a friendly but highly competitive environment.

Each training institution nominates three of its residents to form a team to compete at the state/regional level. Winning teams then advance and represent their state in the international championship. The competition layout is similar to the famous TV show Jeopardy, where each game consists of a set of questions that teams can answer by buzzing in first; depending on their answer they either gain or lose the points assigned to that question. Finally, each team must wage from their collected points before they see the final dilemma question. Team members write their answer on a piece of paper and if they get the answer right, they gain the waged points or otherwise they lose them.



Their journey started by winning the local chapter competition after which Dr. Khdeir became the captain of the North Carolina team, and with two of his colleagues, Dr. Swethaa Manickam and Dr. Alex Bradu, they competed against all the training institutions in the United States, Canada, Central America, and the Caribbean in a three-day competition.



What ensued after that comes as no surprise, they won first place and were awarded the Osler Cup, securing their names in the history of the American College of Physicians.

When asked about what he loved about the event, Dr. Khdeir said, "before the final round I told Alex and Swethaa that I have already won two cups today- their company. They are an amazing couple, and I am glad to have met them.

We waged all our collected points in the final dilemma and got the question right. After we won, we took turns calling our parents on speakerphone. Seeing our parents and siblings proud and happy was the biggest award we got."

Even several years after leaving Alfaisal he continues to be an unforgettable TA to the batches he taught. When we asked Dr. Khdeir to share with us a special message from thousands of miles away, he fervently conveyed, "Do not sell yourself short, you can reach what you aspire for one day; help others and purify your intention. Recognition and awards will follow without you asking for them."

With his undying passion for medicine Dr. Khdeir, without a shadow of doubt, will continue to make us proud, and we pray that the Almighty will light up his path with everlasting wins.

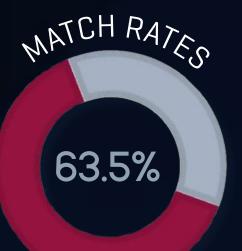

I am Omar Javed Bagal, a 7th Batch Alumnus from Alfaisal University and I am now working as a PGY-2 Internal Medicine resident at the Mayo Clinic in the United States. I came to choose this specialty after my positive experiences during clerkship rotations and I do recommend using these golden years to gauge your interests. I also mentor medical students/graduates including those pursuing the US Medical Residency, and in my leisure time I am a freelance writer as well.

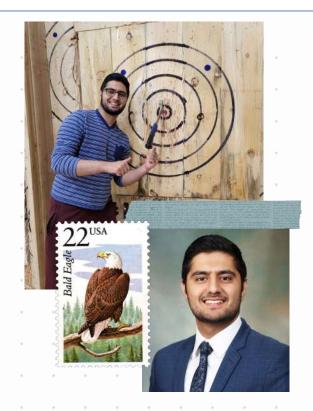
Residency programs in the US can have different rotation structures and scheduling systems, but generally a major factor that will determine what your daily routine looks like is whether you are on an inpatient or outpatient rotation. My program follows a 4 + 4 system which means 4 weeks of inpatient rotation alternating with 4 weeks of outpatient rotation. Outpatient rotations which are clinic-based usually have an 8am to 5pm daily schedule. Inpatient months can vary between specialties, but on our hospital Internal Medicine rotation, we get to the hospital at 6:00 a.m., take a hand off from the night team and then proceed to review our patient charts. After that we see all our patients and then round with the attending physician, usually at 9:00 or 10:00 a.m.

Once rounds are over, we prioritize calling consults and placing orders for medications and labs, and once all time sensitive work is done, we then start working on our progress notes. We have a noon conference from 12:00 p.m. to 1:00 p.m. everyday which is one of our program's educational activities. Depending on how many patients are on our service, we may also be up for new admissions. PGY1 residents are capped at six patients, but you may notice this is lower than the cap of 10 patients you might have heard residents carry in other hospitals - this is due to the higher complexity of patients at our hospital. Residency programs all over the country are expected to follow ACGME work hour laws which set a limit of working 80 hours per week averaged over 4 weeks. The day shift can finish as early as 4:00 p.m. if you are done with all your work and hand it off to your senior. Most often, I would personally finish the day at 5:00-6:00 p.m. The night shift runs from 7:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m.

Every rotation I have done so far in my residency has been an enriching experience in its own way. My Internal Medicine inpatient experience has to be my favorite. It was like my residency personal statement coming to life. All the cliché things I had mentioned in it about internal medicine - great variety of cases, holistically caring for your patient, critically analyzing clinical information - were actually true!! Additionally, the support of my co-residents and the guidance of my attendings made it memorable.

Multidisciplinary teamwork defines healthcare in the US, especially at large centers. At any given time, you have multiple teams participating in a patient's care - the primary care team, consulting services, nursing staff, pharmacists, dietitians, physical therapists, care coordinators and social workers. Mayo Clinic in Arizona is smaller in size than its parent Rochester location, and that likely enhances its family-like atmosphere. There is a great culture of camaraderie, respect and support. Help is always nearby and people will often go the extra mile for you. I do not think all this can be fully appreciated and felt unless experienced in person. My past experiences in the US through SPIRIT (Columbia, 2016 and Mayo, 2017) were very positive and my interactions with people in the system were extremely encouraging, as they spoke highly of its merit-based structure. Your hard work is recognized and you are appreciated and rewarded for it.

A healthy work-life balance is very much encouraged, and everyone respects the "family first" approach. COVID-19 certainly complicated a lot of the social engagements that trainees would participate in. Coresidents occasionally get together, the residency program organizes a yearly retreat and local medical bodies such as the American college of physicians and the State medical board also organize social events for trainees to get together and network. Phoenix is the 5th largest city in the US, and offers a lot in the way of leisurely activities, food, and recreation. Arizona is home to the world-famous Grand Canyon, Horseshoe Bend and the red rocks of Sedona. A 4-5-hour drive West will get you to California while a short drive South gets you to Mexico. Discovering new places on walks and hikes is a staple at Phoenix, there are many great restaurants that have come up in my search.

# Life of a resident United Kingdom



Dr. Sharique Ahmed is a 5th batch alumnus from Alfaisal University and is currently in his 2nd year of residency, known as CT2 (core trainee), in the United Kingdom. He was a part of Med Times during his undergraduate years, so it's pretty near and dear to him. He was the head of photography in 2013-2014 and then served as the director of Med Times in 2014-2015, and it was during this year, that he and his team created the first-ever Alfaisal Yearbook. Eight years later, he is now writing this article for yet another memorable yearbook. He has always been an avid photographer, winning the Med Times photography competition (now equivalent to the Med Times gallery) 3 years in a row.

I always knew psychiatry would be my first and only choice if I were to pursue medicine further than medical school. To understand how the human mind works, why it works the way it does, and how dysfunction in the brain can be the reason behind individuals' illnesses, has always been a fascinating prospect. Best of all, through intervention, we can help them recover or at least manage their illnesses.

In the UK, before you join residency (known locally as "training"; as in, you are being trained to become a specialist), you are meant to work as a "non-trainee doctor" for a year. You can apply to any specialty you want in any hospital – there are no limits. My application focused on psychiatry, and I was absolutely over the moon to receive interviews from psychiatric hospitals. I could finally learn and understand the human mind. Imagine my surprise and disappointment when my consultant asked me to carry out a blood sampling and an ECG on a patient, followed by interpreting it on my very first day. She was not testing me – psychiatry in the UK, for junior doctors, especially in their first year, is less about psychiatry and more about medicine.

# Let me explain!

As is the case in many parts of the world, psychiatric hospitals are usually separate from medical hospitals. They have their own teams and doctors. In the UK, most of the psychiatric components of a patient's care are the responsibility of registrars ( reached after three years of residency/training) and consultants (reached after training as a registrar for three or more years – so eight years in total when counting your pre-residency years). The Junior Doctors (anyone in their first five years of clinical practice) take care of all the physical health-related concerns, especially in their first year. They are then slowly transferred more and more towards the world of psychiatry in their second and third years of training.

Why? This brings me to the first important point about psychiatry in the UK. As a junior doctor in psychiatry, you are considered the only one with enough knowledge to deal with medical problems in the entire hospital. The registrars and consultants are psychiatric experts, not physical health experts. The nurses in psychiatry go through different courses and degrees to become mental health nurses. They are taught about the human mind and how to talk to and deal with patients' emotional health, not how to deal with physical health. You are the only one expected to be good at medical problems. You have just come from two years of foundation experience in medicine, obstetrics and gynecology, surgery, and pediatrics. This is a challenging responsibility to uphold. Add in the fact that during on-calls, you are the only doctor in the entire hospital (responsible for fifteen to twenty wards); this is somewhat stressful.

# Worklife balance and leisure activities:

One of the biggest perks of working in the UK is the work-life balance. By contract, you cannot be made to work more than 48 hours a week. This is an excellent deal and gives plenty of time for doctors to focus on other more important aspects of their life like family, friends, entertainment, hobbies, and progress in other life goals if they so wish to pursue them. UK's mindset (and Europe in general) to work is that it is there to sustain your quality of life – not there to be the focus and primary aspect of your life. I've been able to continue my love of photography here due to the ample time provided to take time off from work.



# A typical working day schedule:

Days/nights are split into on-calls or "normal days." During normal days, junior doctors in psychiatry work from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and are expected to carry out:

Any physical examinations depending on the patient's complaints: this is our primary purpose as juniors – we are the most relied on for physical health concerns. It is essentially like being a medical resident in a psychiatric hospital.

Investigations (mostly blood and ECGs) as needed: psychiatry junior doctors are expected to be experts in ECG interpretation and are provided several courses to achieve this. The main reason for this is that antipsychotics can have several cardiac side effects. Therefore, it is important to regularly check patients' ECGs to ensure that they are safe to continue prescribing their psychotropic medications.

MDT (multi-disciplinary team) meetings: psychiatry is unique because the doctors do not exclusively make decisions. There are team meetings for every patient (a bit like ward rounds but instead happening in a meeting room) to decide their plan and management for the day. These teams include nurses, social workers, pharmacists, family members, and any other expert in their respective fields if relevant to the patient. Psychiatry prides itself in treating all these contributors as equal - and thus, everyone has an equal say in how the patient will be treated. A psychiatric patient's well-being and treatment are not only decided by what medication they are on but also by the observations that the nurses have made, insight from their social workers, and the valuable information that their family members can provide. On any typical day, there are about two to four MDT meetings (lasting 1 hour each). During the day, there are many doctors and staff in psychiatric hospitals. However, it is the on-calls where things get a little complex. During an on-call, you are the only doctor in the entire hospital. These oncalls are split into twilight (5 p.m. to 9 p.m.) or nights (9 p.m. to 9 a.m.). Your responsibilities are exclusively physical health. Medical emergency? Tough - you're on your own. Do you not know how to treat a problem? Tough - figure it out yourself. If there are any psychiatric problems like mania, psychosis, or acute agitation, then you can call the registrar (who is not on-site) for advice. Everything else is your problem to solve. On the positive side, in a few years, you'll have extensive knowledge and exposure to all kinds of medical conditions and their treatments. As I am now a second-year trainee, my job is a lot more focused on psychiatry. Therefore, my current rotation is exclusively to train in providing counseling and psychotherapy to patients.



Concerning holiday plans, COVID-19 meant that I spent my holidays within the UK when not isolated or locked down. It's a tiny island, though it would take centuries to be able to visit all the beautiful places it has to offer. I'm training in the northwest, where we have the cities of Manchester and Liverpool. An hour-long drive to the north takes me to the Lake District, which has the largest lake in England, and an hour to the south takes me to the Cotswolds, an area of England almost exclusively built on stone. Fifteen minutes to the west, and I'm in Blackpool. An hour to the east, and I'm in the historical region of Yorkshire. I have been to some breathtaking places here over the past few years, such as Bath, one of the most picturesque towns in England, known for its famous Roman baths.

# Challenges of living in the UK:

- Why is petrol so expensive?!?! I miss Riyadh's petrol prices (yes, I'm aware they've gone up, but we are literally paying 9 SAR a liter in the UK)
- Why are bills so high?!?!
- Why is food so.... Come to think of it; basically, everything is extremely
  expensive.
- Pay is not as good as in other western countries income is much higher in the USA, Canada, Australia, etc. This even further highlights the issue with everything being so expensive.
- You are assigned to a different hospital every six months for the first six years as a psychiatry resident. This means that you will always be on the move. This can be pretty challenging for many people (and perhaps exciting for others).
- It is often difficult to integrate into society here; most locals spend their free time at the pub. Most non-locals spend their free time, not in the pub. This causes a bit of a social divide.
- Much is said about the dreadful weather here. I can confirm this the
  weather here is horribly gloomy. It is always cloudy; it is always wet
  and often cold. Coming from Riyadh, this was amazing for the first
  month before I realized just how depressing your mood could become
  with this type of weather.

# Upsides of living in the UK:

- Priority is given to the quality of life. They provide many paid leaves: thirty-five days of paid leave a year (forty days if you have five years of work experience), thirty days of paid study leave a year, twelve months of paid maternity leave, paid paternity leave, as well as paid compassionate leave (death of a loved one).
- Free education and healthcare
- English Premier League Live. Self-explanatory.
- Many nearby destinations for holiday travels.

The UK has specific mental health laws and regulations to protect mentally ill patients. It revolves around maintaining an individual's dignity and free will, and I believe it is one of the most beautiful things about working in psychiatry here. There are over one hundred laws in place for mental health patients, and psychiatrists are given the responsibility to learn, understand, practice, and enforce these laws in their day-to-day practice. It is the only specialty in the UK that trusts the doctors to use these laws in the best interests of patients, and that is one of the most significant privileges that society places on psychiatrists.

# A Day in the Life of a resident: Germany 🗢 🌤 🕸 🗘



Before diving into how life as a resident is in Germany, let us first introduce our beloved alumnus, Dr. Mohammed Chaballout. Dr. Chaballout is a graduate of the 4th Batch from Alfaisal College of Medicine. He is currently completing his residency in vascular surgery in Germany. Being a wellrounded person, it is not surprising that Dr. Chaballout is not just a surgical resident but also a photographer and cinematographer and has a knack for event management. Even as a student, he made extensive contributions to the student body during his undergraduate years. He was an integral part of several committees, notably Med Times, the SMILE You're Blessed Cancer support group, and the Alfaisal PreMed program. Follow him as he walks us through a day in his life as a resident doctor in Germany!

Our typical day starts at 7:30 a.m. with a morning report, followed by morning rounds. Those take about an hour to two hours. Once those are complete, we divide ourselves to either do ward work (including tasks such as admitting, discharging, and preparing for next-day O.R.s) or be at the OR that day. Then, at approximately 12:00 p.m., we take a half-hour break if possible, after which we attend the daily radiology meeting to discuss our endovascular cases of the day. Finally, we have a small afternoon round and finish the day at 4:00 p.m.

Of course, the daily routine differs from one hospital to another, but the main outline remains the same. Finally, the night shifts at my hospital are conducted from 7:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m., where two attending doctors stay in the E.R. and manage patients. The doctors are also responsible for managing and overseeing the surgical wards, emergency O.R.s, and the IMC (intermediate care unit).

## How is residency in Germany different from other places?

The system is not centralized, which means if you want to work in a specific hospital, you have to contact them independently. There is no generalized application system and no residency matching. The pros of this are that you can choose where you want to go, from the city to hospital to specialty. This gives you more freedom to find a program better adjusted to your needs. Additionally, the training in Germany is more of a working system than a learning system. There are no annual exams. Only one final board exam is conducted at the end of the residency, meaning you have to keep tabs on yourself and study regularly.

## How is Germany unique in terms of structure and number of years of training?

The program structure is unique because we don't have residency followed by fellowship. One can directly enter their specialty of interest from the get-go. For example, I am currently training in vascular surgery without having to do three years of general surgery prior to this. Instead, I do different surgical rotations within my program itself (adding up to six years

## Are there any world renowned hospitals that are in Germany?

Definitely! The first is the Charité Hospital in Berlin. Another is the Universitätsklinikum Hamburg-Eppendorf (UKE) in Hamburg. Finally, one of the world's most prominent institutes that sets the guidelines for infectious diseases, the Robert Koch Institute, is in Germany.

### How is Germany different in terms of work life balance?

One of the highlights of working in Germany is the work-life balance. What's beautiful about Germany is that there are strict laws that mandate and ensure a good work-life balance. For example, working hours are strictly limited to eight hours a day, and if one happens to stay longer, their overtime is compensated. Furthermore, no employee is permitted to work over forty hours per week, and should they be compelled to do so due to unforeseen circumstances, they are to be given time off the following week (e.g., a post-call day off). This way, all residents and physicians have enough time to spend with their families, engage in their hobbies, and study.

### What are some leisure activities physicians do in their free time in Germany?

Personally, the most attractive leisure activity to me is traveling. Living in Europe, traveling is made easier as all countries are very close to each other. In addition, I get to do my other hobbies on the weekends or during my free time. Many sports are also played here, like football, handball, rowing, ice hockey, and basketball. Other widely enjoyed activities include hiking and cycling.

### What are some upsides of working in Germany?

The lifestyle – allows you to have more time for yourself and time to spend with your family.

It is possible to do your residency in the same field you want to subspecialize in the future. Similarly, it is possible to directly do your residency in cardiology rather than doing a residency in internal medicine first. Health insurance, free education, and a secure lifestyle in the event of pregnancy, disability, or unemployment, are other perks of living in Germany. Additionally, German nationality can be acquired in just five years

### What are some challenges of living in Germany?

of working there.

The language barrier, the language barrier, and the language barrier! This was by far the most challenging obstacle for me. Others include the differences in culture and lifestyle, many laws, and huge amounts of paperwork required for almost anything.



# What teams or medical practices are involved in patient care that are unique to Germany?

Orthopedics and trauma surgery are considered specialties under the same department in over 90% of hospitals in Germany. Thus when someone specializes in these fields, they are known as an orthopedic/trauma surgeon.

# What has been your best rotation experience so far?

I have had many great experiences in my rotations; each of them is unique, but what makes them all special is how informative, nice, and hard-working the German people are. It truly makes every experience worthwhile.

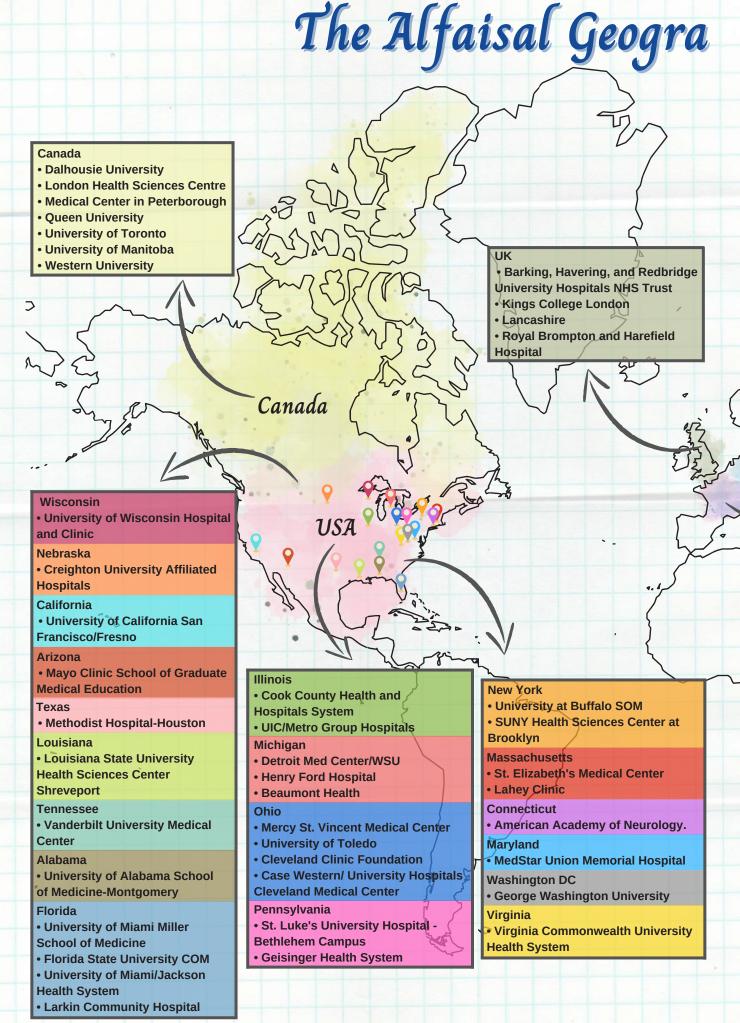
# What is the working culture, lifestyle, and population like there?

# What are some of your most memorable/funny encounters in residency?

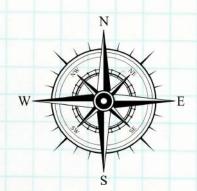
Do you really expect Germans to be funny? Haha, but no, I can't think of a specific encounter that would be worth mentioning, but I will say there are many.

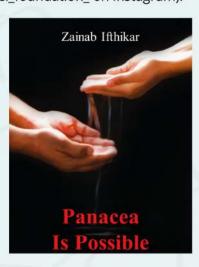
When asked about his future, Ibrahim stated that he plans to combine machine learning with medicine which is a new trend that can be seen in newly published articles.

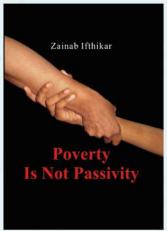


' Pick up your pen and write down your dream; your dream is not a luxury, it's your priority.'

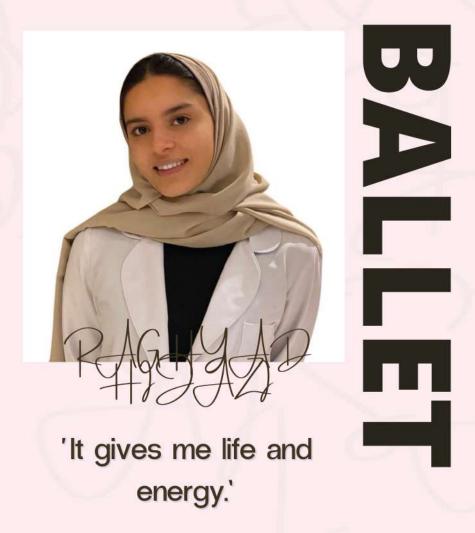

## Facilities

From Clinical Skills — to Internship

The backbone of any successful establishment is the facilities it offers. Whether it is libraries, labs, or internships, Alfaisal is renowned for possessing a wide range of facilities that aid in creating competent and well-established student physicians.

Due to the vastness of the facilities offered at Alfaisal, an interview with Dr. Ismail Mohammed Shakir was conducted to achieve a better understanding of the services provided at Alfaisal University. To begin, students are given free access to the Alfaisal University Library, which was funded by Mr. Hassan Abbas Sharbatly and is directed by Dr. Mustafa Abdelwahid. The library was one of the first digital libraries in the Kingdom and includes a wide range of e-books, dictionaries, articles, and databases, as well as more than 300 hard-cover books which are provided on campus.

Every well-established medical school requires a clinical skills lab and an anatomy lab, and Alfaisal is recognized for having both. The clinical skills lab is a vast program directed by Prof. Mohammed Zafar and is one of the most significant courses offered at Alfaisal. Students begin attending the clinical skills lab during their first year and they attain many important skills which include doctor-patient communication, history taking, physical examination, venipuncture, intubation, and CPR, among other key clinical skills. Furthermore, the anatomy lab is another important element of the students' education at Alfaisal. Directed by Dr. Paul Ganguly, the anatomy lab is constantly being improved to advance the students' learning. From imported cadavers to advanced virtual technology, the anatomy lab provides an ideal learning environment for future doctors.

One of the most crucial opportunities offered at Alfaisal is that students spend their clerkship and internship years at the renowned King Faisal Specialist Hospital & Research Centre (KFSH&RC) located in Riyadh. KFSH&RC was founded in 1975 and is known as the "Mayo Clinic of the Middle East" due to its professional services and competent doctors. Alfaisal students are provided with the opportunity to learn and attain important clinical and communicational skills first-hand at this hospital.

On campus, resources are provided to students through the help of a team of well-established individuals who ensure that all events at Alfaisal proceed without setbacks; the Facilities Department. The facilities department is one of the most vital departments at Alfaisal - it maintains the functionality, efficiency, and comfort of the entire system.

A short interview was conducted with Engineer Malek Al Mobarek, who is the Director of the facilities department at Alfaisal University. Eng. Malek is a graduate of King Saud University with a Bachelor's and Master's degree in Industrial Engineering. He then proceeded to become the operations and maintenance manager at National Gas and Industrialization Company (GASCO) as well as the engineering department manager at Dallah Healthcare, before joining Alfaisal in 2013.

The facilities department is composed of 180 individuals and is divided into four subgroups: Operations and Maintenance, which includes engineering, maintenance, house, and land keeping; Security and Safety, which includes both male and female security guards as well as the safety equipment; Procurement and Inventory, which navigates suppliers and requesters and lastly Logistics, which includes catering, transportation, accommodation, and shipping services.

The college of medicine has many events, including the annual MSA hike and the MSA Medical Emergency Campaign. Ensuring the safety and success of these events relies on the facilities department as it provides the guests, volunteers, and students with transportation, security, and catering.

The facilities provided at Alfaisal are broad, and each one provides the students with exceptional opportunities to develop into the best physicians they can be.

## 2 PREMED

Alfaisal College of Medicine's renowned PreMed 2021 program was one thing we couldn't get enough of last summer. Hosted by Rawan El-Shaer & Hassan Shah as directors, PreMed 2021 was a program founded under the Medical Students' Association with its main goal being to help freshmen at the College of Medicine get a headstart in their med school journey. The program provides students who are fresh out of high school numerous opportunities for growth, learning, and getting attuned to Alfaisal's College of Medicine. Thanks to the incredible social media team, the Alfaisal PreMed Program of 2021 rose to become what was by far PreMed's biggest success story yet. The posts, stories, and reels reflecting the day-to-day activities held on campus drew the attention of many, gathering over tens of thousands of views. Together, the team was able to impressively convey just how fun and engaging the program was, not only for the students but also for everyone involved.

As stated earlier, one of the primary aims of PreMed is to give students a glimpse of medical school without the added pressure, but at the same time accurately depict lectures and extracurriculars taken during the school year nonetheless. Here is where the efforts of the Academic Affairs team come into play! Led by Alaa Hamad, the team made sure that all presentations, content, and information conveyed were clear and concise. Accordingly, the tutors started off by teaching the basics of each topic at hand and steadily built on to the students' understanding from there. ## USMLE by Alfaisal Academy for Continuous Medical Education (AACME) Step 1 Preparation Course Written by: Tasheel Shabir

The USMLE Step 1 exam requires laborious training for extended periods of time, ranging from 4 to 12 months. Preparing for this exam requires a student to invest dedicated time and effort for several months, most preferring the summer months.

The USMLE Step 1 Preparation Course under the umbrella of the Alfaisal Academy for Continuous Medical Education (AACME) provided students who intend to take the USMLE Step 1 exam with a unique opportunity. The students were provided the chance to commit themselves to a study plan that is not crammed yet intensive enough for an average student. This course allowed students to discipline themselves by battling their procrastination and persuaded them to confidently set foot in their USMLE journey.

The course was delivered on the premises of Alfaisal University along with live streaming via zoom for international participants, with a total of over 30 students attending the first cycle.

### **Scholarships**

The attendees received partial scholarships from our valued academic partner AMBOSS.

### Course Syllabus

The course covered the entire content of the First Aid for the USMLE Step 1 (2021) and about 1600 AMBOSS questions, for 60 days, through a unique teaching model. The schedule had several catch-up/recap days interspersed throughout the course and 2 dedicated weeks for revision. The students also received targeted mentoring based on their performance.

### Assessment and Feedback

The students attempted a pre-course self-assessment exam and post-course self-assessment exam by AMBOSS for measurement of student learning. The pre-course self-assessment determined focus areas for teaching during the course, while the post-course self-assessment enabled us to analyze course effectiveness and student learning. Data from student course and tutor evaluation surveys will be used to improve teaching practices and the overall learning experience in future courses.

### Teaching Methodology

The course provided the students with structured learning through multiple teaching strategies including but not limited to, pre-reading assignments, short teaching sessions (STS) (~30 mins) incorporating high yield content, comprehensive TBL sessions that employed questions from AMBOSS, and end of day wrap-up sessions.

Another important feature of the course was that it incorporated reflective and cooperative learning at every step, where the students had the opportunity to analyze their performance on the go and discuss explanations for both right and wrong answers with their group mates as well as with their tutor. Such reflective and cooperative learning strategies generated valuable discussions that addressed learning gaps, improved understanding of high yield concepts, and enhanced knowledge retention. The course also incorporated occasional information sessions on the US medical residency pathway.

### **Summer Program for International** Research Internship and Training (SPIRIT)

SPIRIT is an intensive 10 to 12-week summer research scholarship program for Alfaisal undergraduate medical students. It is designed to provide international research experience and mentorship for medical students (sophomore and above) interested in basic or clinical research. Under the guidance of renowned researchers, students work on a research project and present their findings at competitive research symposia and conferences.

The SPIRIT program also contributes to the College's vision of creating physicians who actively contribute to medical research. Currently, there are 15 participating institutions and more than 50 summer research internships offered with some of the prominent researchers in various fields of basic and clinical research. So far, more than 550 students have participated in the SPIRIT program with several of them publishing their work in prestigious scientific journals.

# Local Research Training and Internship Program (LRTIP)

### Alfaisal Scholar Program in Research Excellence (ASPiRE)

ASPiRE is an in-house sister program of the Summer Program for International Research Internship and Training (SPIRIT) that offers participants a unique and immersive experience and training in basic, clinical, and medical education research. The ASPiRE program contributes to the College's vision of preparing physicians who actively contribute to medical research and accommodates more than 200 participants annually under three of its tracks.

### ASPiRE - Basic Research Track (BRT)



The ASPiRE BRT program, an 8-week immersive experience in a laboratory setting within the labs of Alfaisal University, offered qualified Alfaisal undergraduate medical students the opportunity to train in basic research and become members of research teams. Each week of the program focused on a specific theme within biomedical research that allowed students to discover first-hand the broad spectrum of research activities and fine-tune their skills in basic laboratory techniques. The themes covered under the program were as follows: Oncology, Neuroscience, Developmental Biology, Microbiology and Infectious Diseases, Immunology, Metabolic Disorders and Diabetes.

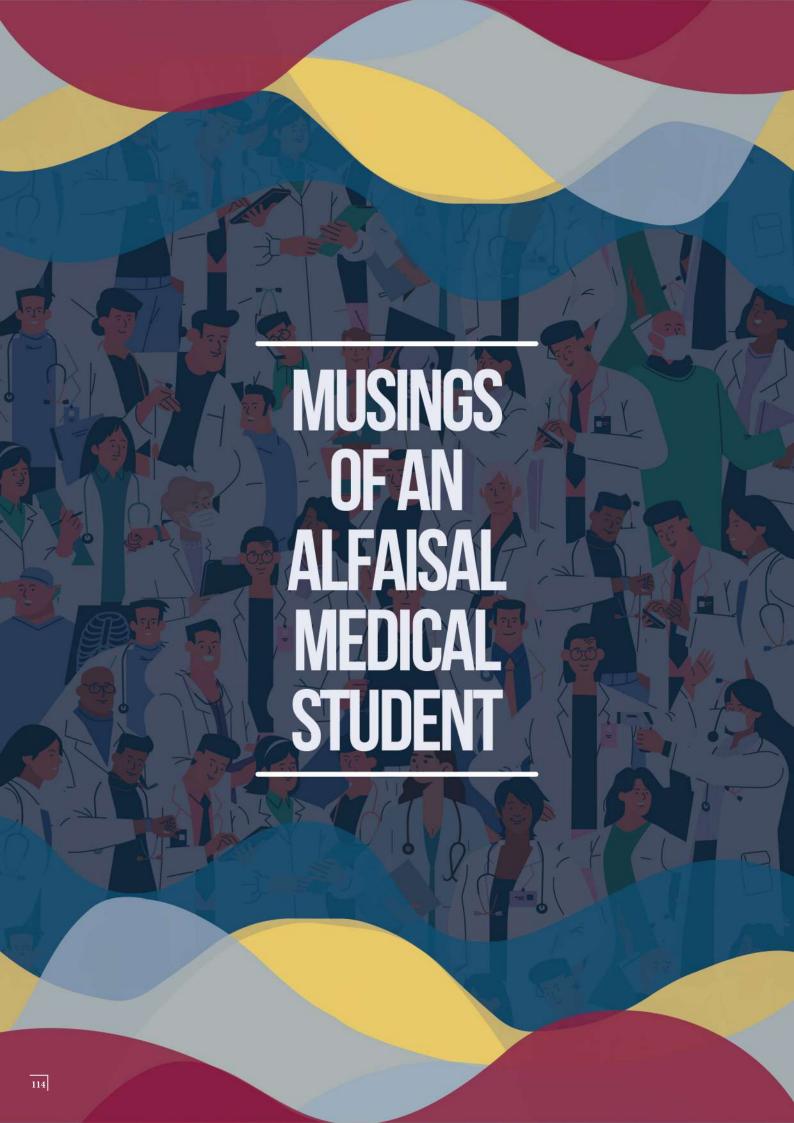














Pre-Clerkship

Attending Al-Faisal University as a medical student has completely transformed my life in many ways; not only in my daily routine but also in my perception of life. Spending my days at a multicultural institute has allowed me to grow and evolve as a person by learning and interacting with people from all sorts of different backgrounds and personalities.

My typical day starts anywhere between 7:00 AM - 9:00 AM depending on what time my classes start since we have different schedules daily. # NAVIGATING YOUR INTERNSHIP YEAR

Dr. Ali Hassan Mushtaq is a 9th batch alumnus from Alfaisal University, currently in his intern year. He has been involved in extensive research, teaching, and mentorship during his time at Alfaisal, namely as a tutor in the PAL program and the USMLE prep course 2021. He writes about how to navigate through internship with special tips on clinical electives.

### **Obtaining Electives**

A US hospital-based work experience in a clinical specialty like Surgery/ Medicine allows one to get acquainted with the routine functioning of the US healthcare environment: history taking and physical examination, using EPIC (Electronic Medical Record), and providing assessment and management plans. However, the primary goal of an elective for an IMG is securing LORs (Letters Of Recommendations) and interview spots for the upcoming Match.

Your goal is to secure clinical electives within the 12 months of internship. The best type of clerkship is a sub-internship where you have the added responsibility of on-call participation and treatment similar to a PGY1, but this differs from one institute to another.

The process is tough and lengthy; be prepared for many rejections. Most institutions host only their students or medical students accredited by the Liaison Committee on Medical Education (LCME) or Alpha Omega Alpha Honor Medical Society (AQA). To optimize your chances, start the process early, preferably right after finishing 5th year. Some institutions require you to apply at least 6 months in advance, but most have a window period of 3 to 6 months before the start of your rotation date.

While most electives appear on VLSO (Visiting Student Learning Opportunities), quite a few require you to apply to individual institutes. Online forms can be found on their websites or simply email en masse to medical education coordinators.

Another way is to employ 'the wasta card': contacts, family friends, relatives in the US, whoever it may be, reach out and ask. Aim for a handson elective. However, a handson observership is also quite useful.

### Requirements

Try to finish a few prerequisites while searching for electives:

- Letters of recommendations
- USMLE Step 1 (required by many institutes)
- Personal statement: Convey your passion for the specialty, your accomplishments and how they have developed you as a person, your future plans, and how this experience in their institute will help you to accomplish those goals.
- CV: Structured, to the point, highlighting professional accomplishments.
- Letter of good standing: Mentions that you are in good standing, have completed core clinical clerkships and all courses have been taught in English (obtained by emailing Ms. Mariam Tabrizi).
- Make an account on VSAS (Visiting Student Application Service)
- Complete the AAMC (Association of American Medical Colleges) immunization form
- Criminal Background Check/Police Clearance: from the local police station (obtain a letter from the university to facilitate the process)
- HIPAA and OSHA certifications (some institutes)
- Valid BLS Certificate
- School final transcript
- TOEFL (some require a score of 26 or 28 in speaking and listening)
- B1/B2 Visa (usually after acceptance, since you need them to send it to you)
- Extras: Malpractice/ professional liability insurance, urine drug screen (some institutes)

### Things I wish I knew

- The experience one individual has in year X will be different in year Y, simply due to changing situations (e.g. COVID) and new collaborations being established.
- Not all doctors are going to hand out LORs. You will get rejected so take the feedback positively and work on yourself to make improvements.
- Avoid comparing your experience with another individual in the same institute. It depends on various factors, most of which are out of your control. Do the best you can and enjoy the experience.

May Allah make this journey easy for all of us! Keep us in your prayers!

### **Obtaining Electives**

- At this point you may be unsure on what you want to peruse. A good way
  to make that decision is by the process of elimination. Do you absolutely
  hate the OR setting, refuse to stand for hours and hours during internal

- Look at the prospects; salary offered, work/life balance (working hours, how many weeks do they work each year), chance of matching.
   Residency is a grueling process, and the institution you train at will dictate your fellowship options and employability in popular states.
- If you want neurosurgery, which is one of the most competitive options
  out there, don't give up simply because its difficult. People have matched
  there but they did put it significantly more effort than other specialties
  (a few years of research in US). But be realistic; you reap what you sow.

### **Getting letters of recommendations (LORs)**

Show interest, participate and get along with your colleagues. Ask questions, act interested and participate in discussions. Be careful, don't overdo it. Everyone wants to leave early so a few questions here and there are acceptable but to question everything will annoy others and effect you negatively. Another vital point is to be interesting, some of my closest friends secured LORs based on discussions about novels and the stock market.

Your performance will atleast for IM be gauged by your presentation skills, using the SOAP criteria. Most important aspect of your presentation includes your assessment of the patient and the tailored management plan. If you do not know simply point that out. Do not give false/ inaccurate information. Best way to excel at this is by having open  $\square$  Participate in discussions and ask questions but be careful not to overdo it. Everyone wants to leave early so a few questions here and there are acceptable but questioning everything will annoy others and affect you negatively. Show interest and get along with your colleagues. Some of my closest friends secured LORs based on discussions about novels and the stock market.

Your performance, at least for IM, will be gauged by your presentation skills of the SOAP criteria. The most important aspect of this includes your assessment of the patient and the tailored management plan. If you do not know, simply say so. Do not give false or inaccurate information. The best way to excel at this is by having an open conversation with residents and asking for their feedback before presenting in morning rounds. Many times, the resident may provide tailored plans for you to present if you build a good relationship. Similarly, if a resident is asked a question and you know the answer, do not interject until it is redirected towards the team. Do not try to undermine the residents in any way. They have a say in your residency application and sometimes the attending gets feedback on your performance through them. End of the week, first ask for feedback and how to improve yourself. If you receive a positive response, proceed to humbly inquire if they are willing to write you a LOR and specify its importance for IMGs. If they accept, write them an email mentioning what you have learned with them along with your CV and personal statement. Inform them that they will be required to upload the letter on ERAS (Electronic Residency Application Service) once you get your token, after graduation.

Aim to obtain 4+ LORs. People have matched with 1 or 2 but aim to get at least 4 as not everyone who promised a LOR may deliver when match season approaches. The finest LORs are from institutes like Mayo or Cleveland Clinic, from a core faculty member who writes you a personalized LOR. This is the bar that most students don't get to meet, which is okay. While it may be debatable, a personalized LOR, written by someone you worked with for a long time from a small institute is probably better than a generic one written by someone from a top institute. Alternatively, some program directors would not prefer a LOR from someone who shares your last name or nationality. However, something is better than nothing so don't feel shy in asking. with your residents and asking their feedback before presenting in morning rounds. Many at times, the resident will provide the tailored plans for you to present if you build a relationship.

### Choosing the right elective

You may be unsure about which field you want to pursue right now. A good way to make this decision is by the process of elimination: Do you absolutely hate the OR setting, refuse to stand for hours and hours during internal medicine rounds, or simply dislike dealing with adolescents? Do you want to take the 'ROAD to an easy life' (Radiology, Ophthalmology, Anesthesia, Dermatology)? Make sure to decide which route you want to take. You may choose to apply to multiple specialties during the match process (e.g. IM and Family Medicine).

Look at the prospects: salary offered, work/life balance (working hours, weeks per year), and the chance of matching. Residency is a grueling process and the institution you train at will dictate your fellowship options and employability in the popular states.

If you're interested in neurosurgery, one of the most competitive options out there, don't give up simply because it seems difficult. People have matched there, although they had to put in a lot more effort than other specialties (e.g. a few years of research in the US). Above all, be realistic; you reap what you sow.

End of the week, ask for feedback first and what steps need to be taken to improve. If a positive response is received then proceed to asking in a humble manner if they are willing to ask write you an LOR and its importance for us as IMGs. Once they accept, write them an email including what you have learnt with them, your CV and personal statement. Inform them that they will be required to upload the letter on ERAS once you get your token (after graduation).

The finest LORs are from institutes like Mayo/ Cleveland/ Yale where you have done a clinical elective, from a core faculty member who writes you a personalized LOR. This is the bar which most students don't get to meet, which is okay.

While it may be debatable, LOR which are personalized, written by someone you worked with for a long time from a small institute is probably better than a generic one written by someone from a top institute Again, some program directors would not prefer an LOR with someone with your last name or same nationality. Something is better than nothing, don't feel shy asking.

### **Tips**

- Apply as a medical student (includes interns): Considered the highest level of experience a student can obtain in the US, superior to observership/ externships. Inpatient should be prioritized over the ambulatory setting.
- Clinical electives may be done between your 4th and 5th year summer but prioritize your STEP examinations instead
- Complete Step 1 and 2 before going for electives as studying for Step 2 during rotations is difficult (yet not impossible)
- As per university policy, half of your internship in Riyadh can be done
  in private institutes so finish them in the first 6 months while you
  prepare for exams and electives.
- Some sub-internships, e.g. Mayo Clinic, may require you to have completed at least one month of USCE (US clinical experience)
- Avail the health insurance discount offered through the IO website.
- Understand that even when thoroughly planned, things may not go your way. You may not get into the program you wanted or have to rent a car to get to different places but in the end, make sure to not make compromises on what you went there to achieve.
- Electives have more to do with your personality and social skills rather than your knowledge. Try to present a reliable, amiable personality.
- Take advice from students who have recently gone through the process as things are rapidly evolving.

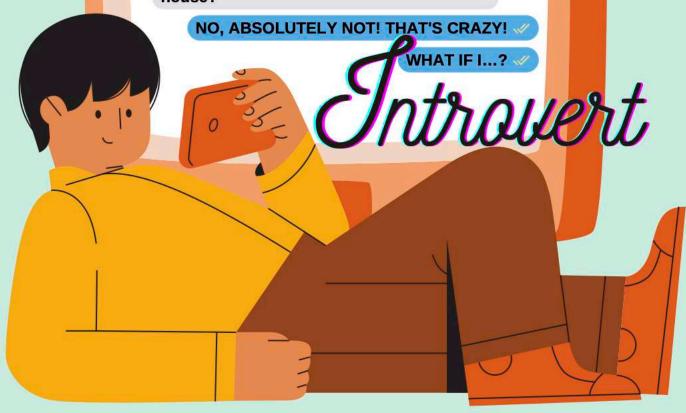

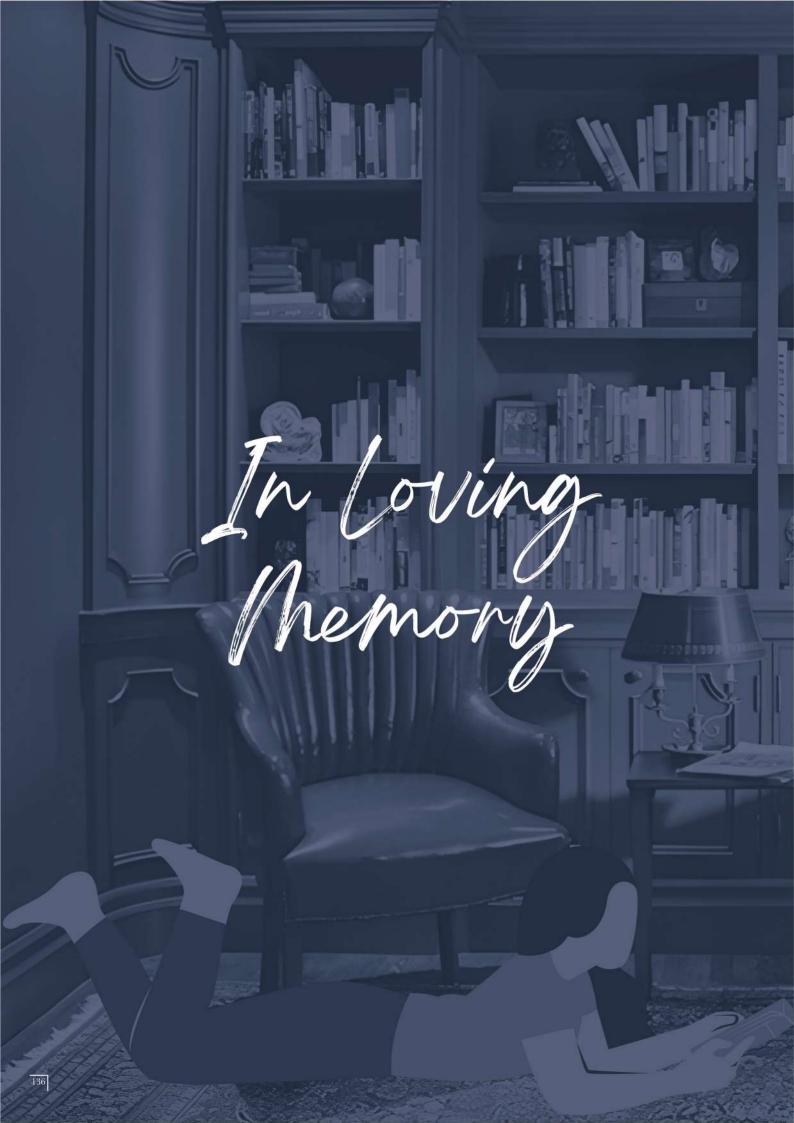

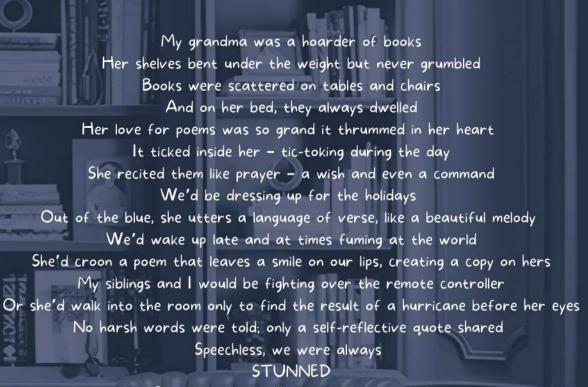

Days and nights of career-building ended by the irreversible doings of a scandal.

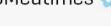

Awards Team: Manages and improvises conferences and awarding ceremonies. This team will take care of events like the dean's list ceremony









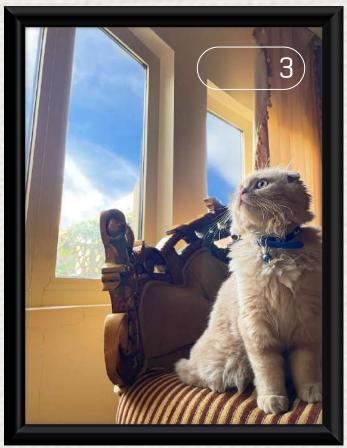




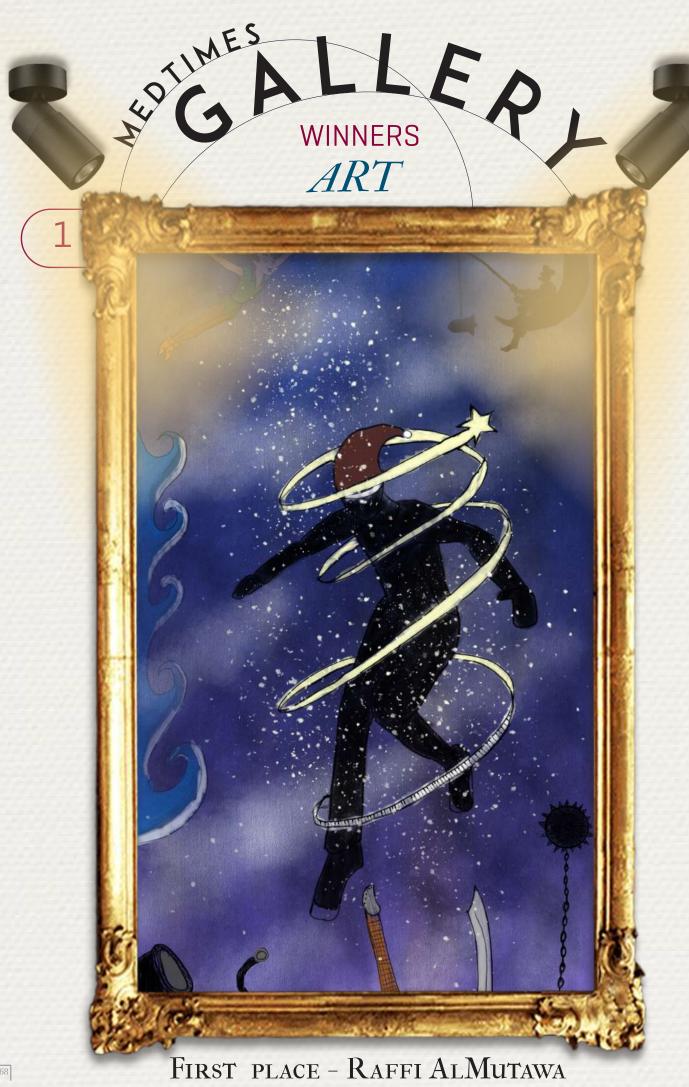

Long hours of study sessions with my study partner, from academics to discussing life. Definitely one of my top Alfaisal memories!

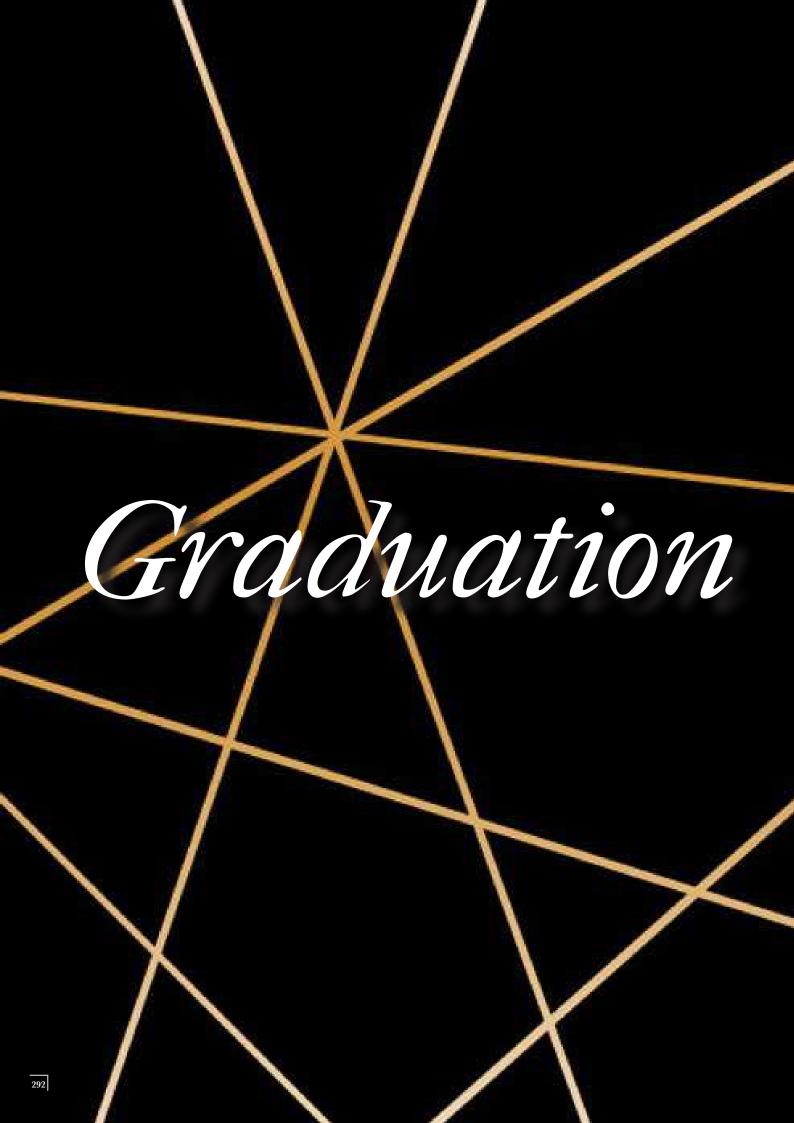
Alfaisal made 'back to school' a happy feeling, just because I got to reunite with my lovely friends.

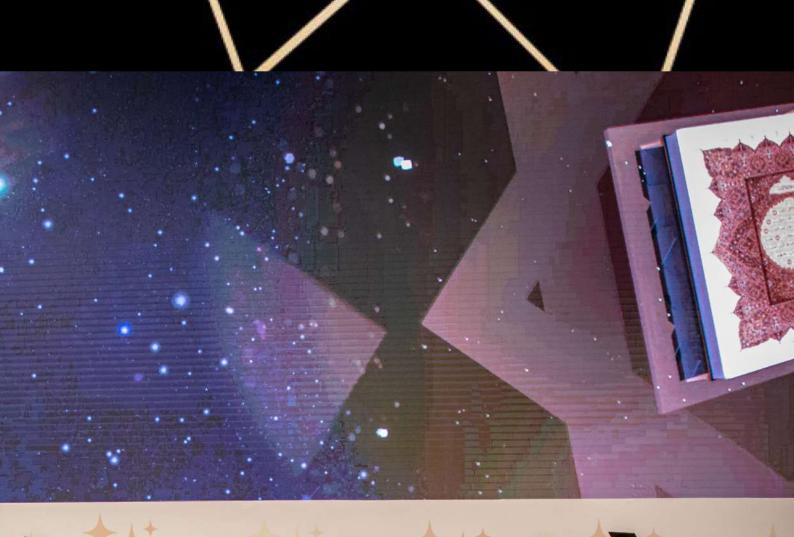










































































































































































































































































































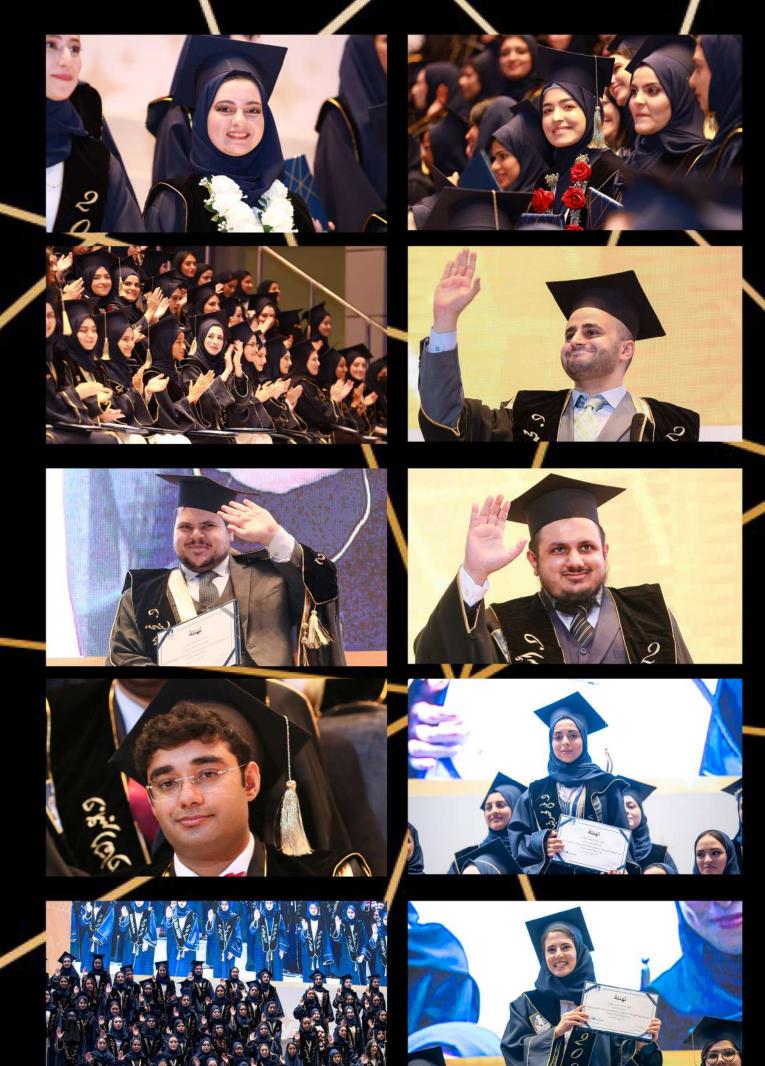
