






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ALFAISAL UNIVERSITY

In addition to this, there was also the difficulty of appearing more appealing to the Saudi demographic who had free and much safer alternatives at the time. As a result when Alfaisal's doors opened only 50 students entered. Little did they know at the time they were going to be the ambassadors to an ever-growing successful association on a global level.

The beauty of change lies in the fact that sometimes you could be a part of it without actually knowing. As Dr. Kattan states "The students of today are smarter than before". He further emphasizes our adaptability to utilize technology which should be taken advantage of. Since medicine is rapidly evolving, Alfaisal strives to develop well-rounded physicians with a wide skill set to flourish when they enter an extremely dynamic professional world. To achieve this, changes curriculum, the campus, and facilities are always in motion.

Academics and environment are two sides of the same coin, both are needed to bring out the best in students. When compared to several years ago, the campus had undergone several upgrades. Our dean informs us that the COM building is expected to be inaugurated in the very near future. This building is designed to have newer facilities such as animal and simulation labs to further enhance our future physicians' skills. Future campus expansions aren't only for academics but for extracurriculars in mind as well. In regards to the curriculum, several changes will soon be implemented to align it with the level of knowledge not on a local, but global level. New changes include introducing electives from other colleges such as the College of Law. This will further increase the versatility of the students broadening their aspects career-wise.

Obviously, these changes yield results. As of 2023, our students attained the highest average score on board exams, and with 65% of all international applicants who got accepted into the US being graduates from our outstanding university, in addition to the countless published papers by the students and several hours of service to the community to educate, guide, and simply put a smile on their faces.



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Interview with Or. Mustafa Abdelwahid by Abduhu Amer

Change. It surrounds us wherever we turn. Butterflies curiously crawling out their cocoons to be tickled by their first feathery breeze. Tulips quietly blooming as the first stroke of Spring warmth greets the Earth's canvas. Skies blushing a gentle pink hue whilst the Sun gradually retreats into the ocean for another nighttime. Each day invites its own unique joys, challenges, and experiences, and it's exactly what fascinates Dr. Mustafa Abdelwahid about his role as Dean of Student Affairs.

Life before Alfaisal, he explained, was no different. With a background in International Law, Global Affairs and Political Science, and Library Information Science, including a PhD in Public Policy and Public Administration from Auburn University, a penchant for knowledge on the surrounding world and a keenness for exploration led him on his own Homeric odyssey. Travels across Sudan, UAE, the former Soviet Union, and the United States allowed him to evolve just as they did, experiencing numerous periods of reform first-hand, including the election of the first African-American president. So, when AU underwent change of its own, opening its doors to female students for the first time in 2011, there was no doubt that Dr. Mustafa's path would once more become intertwined with new beginnings.

An avid frequenter of Riyadh's International Book Fair, he initially joined the university as librarian, wearing his heart on his sleeve when it comes to his love of reading. A devoted seeker of change however, his fascination with the King Faisal Foundation's vision of diversity and growth meant it was only time before he'd be compelled to surf AU's shifting tides as Dean of Student Affairs. As a father of 5, there's only so many times he could watch his own children traverse the wilderness of university applications, but now, he feels blessed having a constant reminder of its irreplaceable awe and euphoria across every unique journey. With an integral position like his, there's been no greater fulfilment than following the success of each new batch as he pursues his own array of new milestones being served his way like a five-course meal.

PAVING THE WAY TO A MORE

COLLEGE OF LAW

Directing a college certainly requires having vast experience in the respective field and its academics, and Dr. Torki is no exception. His career started as a secretary on an arbitration board. Meanwhile, Saudi Arabia signed the New York Convention, so he then pursued a Ph.D. in the London School of Arbitration, wanting to be able to play a role in helping Saudi Arabia become more conducive to arbitration while addressing Islamic legal issues. Soon afterward, he began his academic career, where he started teaching in the UK at workshops and specialized classes. After having returned to Saudi Arabia in 2008, he was offered a position in PSU where he taught MBA students and the very first batch of female law students conflicts of law and business law.

As we celebrate 15 years of success in our university, we welcome a new college on campus. As Alfaisal University recognizes the demand for diplomats to help continue developing the country, the College of Law has come to fruition. Although very young, it has a bright future ahead of it, being led by the esteemed Dr. Torki Abdullah Alshubaiki. We had the opportunity to speak with him and gather more insight into the college and the dean himself.

Not everything is always smooth sailing, however, and such was the case with developing the curriculum for the College of Law. The biggest issue faced was several applicants and their families asking why certain components of typical law colleges weren't present such as Sharia law. The curriculum is designed for those who want to be involved in politics, diplomacy, or international financial transactions, among others. The dean that graduates of Alfaisal encompass knowledge equivalent to that of an MLB in the UK, and a BA from a Saudi university. Hence. Dr. Torki repeatedly emphasized that students should know what career path they desire to follow. Moreover, they must be aware that not all paths are provided by Alfaisal, such as that of a litigator, which requires fluency in the Arabic language, while all subjects in the university are delivered in English.


COLLEGE OF LA


Since the college has just recently been formed, there's still a lot of room for it to grow. Dr. Torki wants to ensure it exceeds expectations, bearing several plans in mind. This includes securing essential tools for students, such as LexisNexis. He is also continuously working with other universities and associations to enable students to take the Bar exam internationally, as well as developing student exchange programs.

> Lastly, there is no graduating batch to measure the success of our students, but Dr. Torki sees great potential in them. This is because when compared to his experience teaching in 2008, the gap in skill and knowledge has narrowed, where most students now are fluent English speakers and can enroll directly at the College without requiring the UPP year first.

> Potential students who want to enroll may fear they might not have the skills to make it in the real world, however during the interview Dr. Torki assures them, saying: "The combination of many types of subjects will result in having someone in the comparative world develop a comparative perspective over everything they come across in the legal field". In other words, Alfaisal's College of Law is equipped to qualify students with all the essential skills to make a difference in their line of work.

INTERVIEW with DR. BAJIS DODIN

Dr. Dodin has a charm to his words, through which he manages to enrapture his company into a delightful conversation. He mentions his college like it is a beautiful name (which he later reiterates), expressing every little detail that makes it special.

Dr. Dodin begins by passing on important advice to prospective College of Business students, ignoring all that current business students say and learning about the course through their designated CoB100 program. The program, in brief, is a glimpse into the college life of any College of Business student, simulating an accurate academic experience.

Furthermore, to ensure student satisfaction throughout their time at the College of Business, the faculty, curriculum, and supervision must be meticulous. The dean reveals that they recruit the finest candidates to represent their faculty and have one of the best business faculties in all of the GCC. The curriculum is a perfect blend of local business as well as the latest curricula in the United States. They endeavour to keep it in line with Vision 2030. He expresses great satisfaction in witnessing the commendable efforts undertaken by Alfaisal University, alongside numerous other establishments in the Kingdom, to reduce gender segregation. By acknowledging the inconveniences that arose from the previous restrictions, such as the need to be secluded when visiting restaurants with one's spouse, the Dean views these progressive measures as a significant step towards increased inclusivity and equality. Moreover, by fostering greater interaction and collaboration between genders, these transformations have the potential to cultivate a diverse and inclusive learning environment that benefits not only the students but society as a whole. In the years to come, the dean believes the students will only become more empowered as they are the future of the workforce.

The wise Dr. Bajis concludes our conversation with some very valuable pieces of advice for all students at Alfaisal University.

Learn and grow socially and academically, develop yourself as a person, do not rely on your familial connections, and do not forget the university that taught you to be humble.

As Alfaisal University's College of Engineering marks its 15th anniversary, now is the perfect opportunity to consider the accomplishments of the past and the goals for the future. Since its inception, the college has come a long way with a focus on giving its students an excellent education while remaining current with market trends and technological advancements.

Alfaisal 's Accomplishments

Dr. Muhammed Anan, the college's dean, is pleased with the institution's accomplishments and the success of its graduates. Nine years ago, Dr. Anan began teaching software engineering at the college. Since then, he has held a number of posts, including chair of the department, vice dean for student affairs, and now dean.

The school is open to new ideas and is thinking about launching new majors including biomedical engineering with concentrations in radiology, devices and instruments, and artificial intelligence and healthcare. Additionally, the college wants to expand both horizontally and vertically by introducing double majors.



From Classroom to Clinic: Medical Clerkship in Alfaisal University

In the 4th year, students rotate in various departments, namely pediatrics, surgery, internal medicine, and OBGYN, in order to develop a foundation in their practical clinical skills. Essential skills, such as diagnosis, history-taking, physical examination, and patient management, are later perfected and expanded upon in their 5th year. Students get to practice integrated medicine, which allows them to gain knowledge in multiple related subspecialties concurrently, like pediatric neurology, neurosurgery, and psychiatry. In addition, students rotate at 3-week intervals in medical subspecialty departments, including cardiology, hematology, and oncology, as well as subspecialty surgeries incorporating ophthalmology, ENT, and orthopedics. Lastly, the clerkship also includes ambulatory care, where students rotate in specialties like family medicine, emergency medicine, and anesthesiology.

But what makes Alfaisal's clerkship program different from other colleges and universities in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia is the ultimate goal of Alfaisal, which is to ensure that students are confident, prepared, and skilled by guaranteeing extensive practice in common medical cases. Hence, students are presented with rare and unique cases that motivate, diversify, and broaden their medical experiences, and they are even encouraged to complete their internship and clerkship abroad if possible.

Along the way, clerkship directors and the university's clinical and internship directors, Dr. Sabri and Dr. Makadma, continuously supervise the program to provide guidance, assistance. and progression. Initially. students only attended the tertiary care hospital, King Faisal Specialist Hospital and Research Centre. Throughout the years, with the intake of more passionate students and the expansion of the university, primary and secondary care hospitals such as King Fahad Medical City and King Saud Medical City have been included.

Dr. Sabri, the Clinical Director at Alfaisal, advises students to take their 4th year as an opportunity to develop their skills, see patients on their own, and utilize the feedback provided by their healthcare seniors and supervisors. It is a core belief at Alfaisal University to strive for greatness and evolution. Dr. Sabri, therefore, hopes to integrate a clinical elective in the following years to allow students to delve into a specialty of their choosing during the clerkship. The future is bright for Alfaisal University and for the multitude of students who can proudly serve their communities as accomplished

His Royal Highness, King Faisal Al-Saud was born in Riyadh in 1906, and is considered one of the most prominent figures in modern Saudi Arabian history. He was the third son of His Royal Highness King Abdulaziz Al-Saud, the founder of the modern Saudi state.

King Faisal received his early education from traditional Islamic scholars, and later attended schools in Riyadh and Cairo. He became involved in government affairs at a young age, serving as his father's advisor and representing Saudi Arabia in various international forums.



They will present their work on posters and organize presentations to deduce their medical research. Additionally, there is a scholarship **reward** for students who have an outstanding academic sheet, have thorough and credible research, and those who volunteer continuously. has taught me- Work hard, and place your tawakkul in Allah, and nothing can stop you.








Alfaisal University has always been a pioneer in higher education and research ever since it was established in 2002 under the internationally reputed King Faisal Foundation.





Be proud of your success! And thank all those who contributed to it dearly. I wish you the best of every journey you take."



We had the honour of speaking with Dr. Ramah Halaf, a member from that very first batch! She stands proud as a dermatologist based in Riyadh, carrying the knowledge she acquired from her years at AU with delight!

It wouldn't be fair to speak on the matters of the first female batch in AU without speaking to a member of that same bustling crowd... Alfaisal has promised constant improvement, and providing the best for its students, it has fulfilled that promise, Dr Ramah states

Dr. Ramah left Alfaisal with more than the ability to practise medicine spectacularly, but also with many friends! She talks about how wholesome it was to see where her colleagues ended, whether they stuck to the specialties they had in mind when starting medicine or changed. It's also good to keep in touch, as you could always give a trusted friend a call for a quick reference or even a consultatio

Her second piece of advice:

"Keep in touch with people from university, be open to creating new friendships and experiences with them, too!"

So how would such an influential person like Dr. Ramah describe her years in AU? One word, "empowering"

Yet, there are still many challenges that women still face in the field of medicine, especially in the context of being underrepresented in certain specialties. Ultimately, it all pays off and you will make a wonderful impact on the medical world, so, good luck!

As for the new first year babies, here is Dr. Ramah's advice

You're about to embark on the journey of a lifetime, and the next years will be challenging but rewarding.

Remember three things:

1) Be Curious

Ask questions, one of the the most important qualities as a student is curiosity

Approach each class, lecture, lab, and conversation with a desire to learn. Ask questions and seek out answers, this keeps you motivated

2) Be Disciplined

When motivation fails to get you out of bed, discipline will. Commit yourself to excellence and hard work, make study schedules and a study group, set a clear goal for yourself

3) Be Compassionate

Medicine is a very humane field, based upon service and care for the lives for others. It can be easy to lose sight of that goal and lose that compassion, to see patients as clinical scenarios and OSCE stations rather than what they really are, humans

Ending our conversation, we asked her of her fondest moment of her time in Alfaisal.

The collaboration of the batch both with one another and with all previous ones. In AU, students compete with themselves to be the very best version of themselves, not with one another due to limited seats. This sets the bar for success high, and rids AU med of the biggest stereotype of medical school, the cutthroat competitiveness.
